DOL: REGULATIONS FOR FFCRA PAID LEAVE

The US DOL has issued a temporary regulation to implement the paid leave mandates of the Families First Coronavirus Response Act (FFCRA). The regulations provide direction for administration of the Emergency Paid Sick Leave Act (EPSLA) and the Emergency Family and Medical Leave Expansion Act (EFMLEA).

CARES ACT TAX CREDIT TO KEEP EMPLOYEES ON PAYROLL

The CARES Act has put a tax credit into place with the intention of avoiding layoffs or terminations of current employees. The employee retention credit is a fully refundable tax credit equal to 50% of up to \$10,000 in wages paid by an eligible employer whose business has been financially impacted by COVID-19. This tax credit applies to qualified wages paid after March 12, 2020, and before Jan. 1, 2021.
